More than 400 schools in Washington participate in the Navigation 101 program



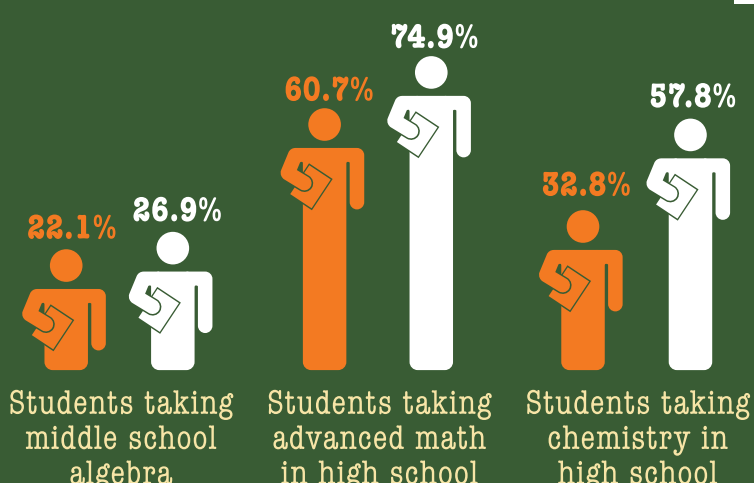

Navigation 101 in a nutshell

- What is it?** A K-12 college and career readiness program.
- How does it work?** Every student is provided with an educator-advisor who guides them through a grade-by-grade academic, financial, and career exploration curriculum designed to help each student develop a post-secondary plan.
- Why is it unique?** Every student is connected with a teacher-advisor who helps them develop their plan and makes sure they stay on track. Students meet with their advisor and family members at least once a year to review their plan and work with the same advisory through middle school and high school.
- Where is it being used?** 19 schools are receiving funding from College Spark to implement the program and take part in a robust evaluation of the program's impact. Nearly 500 schools in Washington are implementing some aspect of the program.
- When did it start?** Navigation 101 was first developed and implemented by the Franklin Pierce School District in 2000.

Parent engagement:

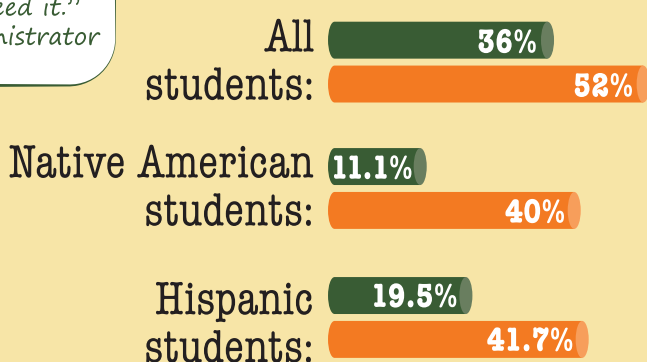
In 2013, **79%** of parents attended Student-led Conferences, compared with **40%** in 2010.

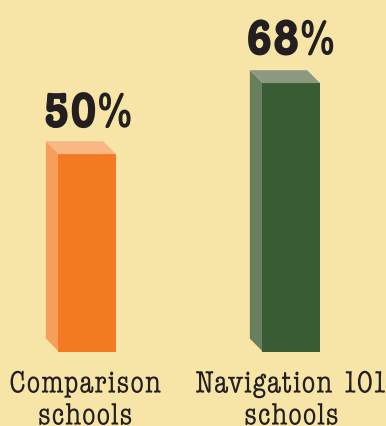


Student engagement:

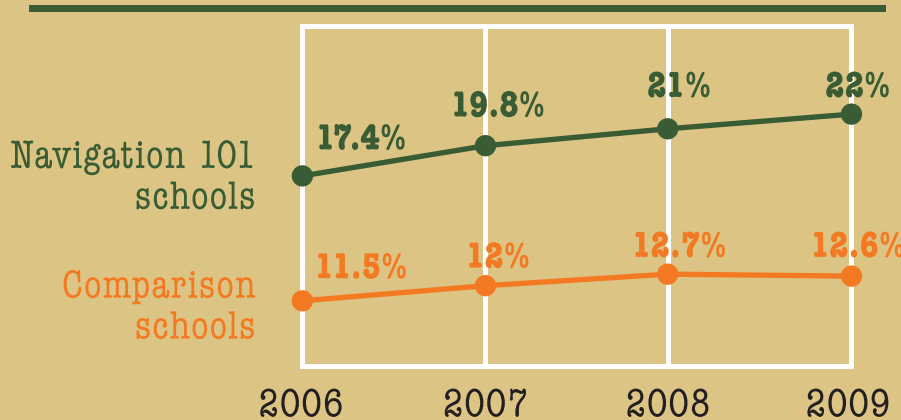
In 2013, **75%** of students were informed about college entrance requirements, compared with **46%** in 2010.

3 keys to implementing Navigation 101

- Credit counts:** Students and teachers reap greater benefits when students earn credit for advisory.
- Create a culture:** When school leaders embrace Navigation 101, enthusiasm spreads.
- Collaborate:** Collaboration among teachers, counselors and administrators leads to greater student success.
